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EYFS

After a very busy half term settling into school life, the children are looking forward to their well-deserved break. This week we have been practising for our Harvest festival and the children have perfected their version of the song 'Busy for the Harvest'. In phonics, they have been learning the sounds 'm' and 'd' and are excited to be taking home their first reading books today.

Year 1

In Year 1, we have been practising our songs ready for the Harvest festival. We have also been busy writing instructions for Beegu on how to be a good friend.

In maths, we have started to write number sentences using our number bonds to 10.

Year 2

Year 2 loved making and testing their egg 'helmets' this week. They followed their plans and created a 'helmet' that would protect the egg when it was dropped from a height. After testing them, the children evaluated the effectiveness of their protector and explained why it may not have been successful. Within Art the children have been developing observational drawing skills and with Theme they have been finding out about King Charles III.

Year 3

Year 3 had more fun trying to paint with their homemade paints made from flour, water and spices. They found it tricky but loved it. In science we have learnt about fossils and how they are made. The children were very excited to hear that fossils can still be found. They are looking forward to the Harvest festival where they are all going to sing a new hymn which has just been composed. We really hope you enjoy it!

Year 4

Year 4 have been very busy this week! We have been practicing our lines for our Harvest festival celebration. In English, we have been researching information on Ancient Egyptian pharaohs for our non-chronological report. The children completed their experiment in science. We investigated how the loudness of a sound changes with the distance it is away from you. We used a variety of instruments in our experiment. In our theme lesson, we looked at how Egyptians prepared themselves for the afterlife and we looked at the different stages of mummification. It has been a very busy, but rewarding half term, I hope the children enjoy their well-earned break!

Year 5

Year Five enjoyed their Art lessons this week. Their artwork will be linked to their Science topic, Space. They started by exploring the purpose and impact of images from the 'Space race' era of the 1950s and 60s. They then used their sketchbooks to explore drawing through line, tone, shape and textures and experimented with materials and tools to replicate part of a space image that they had chosen. Year Five also used their computing lesson to investigate search engines but also to help them carry out vital research for their Anglo-Saxon life fact-file. We also finished of the half-term with a fun basketball tournament.

Year 6

We had a fun time on Wednesday when some of the Year Six parents joined us in the hall for our reading lesson. It was great seeing the text on the big screen! We enjoyed showing the adults how we practice and develop our reading skills – they were surprised at how active the lesson was and we even had time for a word game at the end. Thank you to those parents who came. Please don't worry if you couldn't make it – there will be another one next term.
